1. PURPOSE

This memorandum provides guidance for issuing a submitted samplecertificate inspection for Hops.

2. BACKGROUND

The Hop Inspection Handbook prohibits a submitted sampleinspection certificate from showing, "...directly or indirectly, thegrower's lot number, the number of bales, carrier identification, or theorigin of the hop". No other commodity under the purview of theFederal Grain Inspection Service (FGIS) has a similar prohibition. Hops industry stakeholders expressed to FGIS that permitting hopsquality certificates to show growers lot number information wouldfacilitate inspection, which would further facilitate moving the hopsbales into storage, thus preserving quality.

3. POLICY

Effective immediately, the following policy is implemented with regardto submitted sample inspection certificates for Hops:

a. A submitted sample inspection certificate must show the results of an inspection for quality of hop based on a sample submittedby an applicant. An inspection for quality may include kind, class, grade, factor analysis, equal-to-type, or any other qualitydesignation as defined in the standards or instructions.

- b. Each submitted sample inspection certificate must show that the results of the inspection apply only to the sample describedby the certificate and not to the lot from which the sample mayhave been taken.
- c. A submitted sample may be identified by the applicant bysample number, producer's name, letters of the alphabet, or any other identification, including a lot or carrier identifier. If a submitted sample is not adequately identified, the inspector may assign a number to the sample or request the applicant to assign a number or other identifier to the sample.

Note: No submitted sample inspection certificate remarks will be issued that shows, directly or indirectly, the number of bales or the origin of the hop. The applicant can provide a lot identification with these identifiers, but official personnel may not attest to number of bales or origin in any official remarks, since official personnel did not obtain the sample.

The Hop Inspection Handbook, Section 4.3, Submitted Sample Certificate Inspection, will be revised to reflect this revised policy.

4. FILING INSTRUCTIONS

File a copy of this memo with the Hop Inspection Handbook until the handbook is revised to include this change. Field office managersmust ensure that a copy of the memorandum is available to official agencies operating within their circuit.
